

DAY TO DAY LIFE

The British Council have created a free online course **Prepare to Study and Live** in the UK to help you get ready for life in the UK.

They also have a free course specifically about mental health and wellbeing **Managing Your Wellbeing When** Studying in the UK.

We've also highlighted a few topics below that we think you'll find useful:

WHAT WILL THE WEATHER BE LIKE IN **NEWCASTLE?**

Newcastle has cold, rainy winters and mild, relatively rainy summers. Weather can be unpredictable, and you may experience four seasons in one day.

Winter days are short with daylight from around 8am to 4pm. The weather is cloudy, humid, and windy, with frequent rain and occasional snow. The coldest nights can drop to -7°C (19°F).

Summers are mild or cool, with highs of around 19°C (66°F). Heatwaves rarely reach Newcastle. Days are long with daylight from around 5am to 9pm.

In winter you will need:

- A warm waterproof coat
- Warm waterproof shoes or boots
- Scarf, hat and gloves
- An umbrella

In summer you will need

- A light jacket or raincoat
- An umbrella
- Sunscreen
- Sunglasses

Check the current weather forecast.

WHAT ARE THE RULES AROUND **SMOKING AND VAPING?** In the UK, **smoking is prohibited in all** enclosed workplaces, public buildings, and on public transport.

On Campus, smoking, including the use of electronic cigarettes or vapes, is not permitted in any part of the premises with the exception of the designated smoking shelters.

CAN I DRIVE IN THE UK?

Newcastle is a compact city, so it is easy to get around on foot or by public transport. It is also ideally situated to visit many sights in the UK by train and coach, so driving a car is not a necessity.

If you do plan to drive in the UK you will need to consider many factors such as insurance, tax and an MOT for your vehicle, as well as whether your licence is valid in the UK. For more information please see the **UK Council for** International Student Affairs (UKCISA).

WHAT TO BRING

ESSENTIAL ITEMS

PACKING CHECKLIST

- Warm clothes, including a waterproof winter coat (if you don't have winter clothes you will find lots of shops in Newcastle City Centre)
- Gadgets (mobile phone, charger, universal adapter and laptop or tablet if you have one)
- Things that remind you of home such as family photos, favourite books, a cuddly toy
- Essential toiletries only you will be able to purchase larger items from local shops
- Any prescribed medication to last until you have registered with a local GP/doctor

DOCUMENTS CHECKLIST

Passport

Driving License

Your visa decision letter or email

Short-term (30 day) visa vignette.

Plane ticket (or ticket for ferry/train)

Your letter of acceptance from Northumbria which includes your Confirmation of Acceptance of Studies (CAS) number.

Evidence that you have enough money to support yourself while studying in the UK, for example recent bank statements, or proof of scholarship or sponsor's letter.

Vaccination certificates and x-ray certificate (if required)

Accommodation confirmation

Currency (safer to carry debit/credit cards than cash, but always good to have some cash on hand)

Original or certified copies of academic documents (e.g. previous results, International English Language Testing System (IELTS)

Photocopies of documents (to keep as backup)

Use our helpful checklists detailing what important documents and items you'll need to pack, so that you have everything you need once you arrive here.

BEFORE YOU ARRIVE

Whether you plan on staying in University or private accommodation, once you have your arrangements in place it's time to start preparing what to bring with you.

FURTHER INFORMATION

You can find out more information on preparing for your arrival on the **UK Council for International Student Affairs** (UKCISA) website.

RESTRICTED ITEMS

Remember not to bring restricted entry products when travelling into the UK.

YOUR LUGGAGE

Be mindful of what you pack, as excess baggage fees can be costly. It's also wise to consider buying travel insurance to cover any potential loss or damage to your luggage.

WHAT ABOUT BEDDING, TOWELS AND **OTHER NECESSITIES?**

You will need to pre-order bedding and towels for your arrival as they will not be supplied in university accommodation or private rental accommodation. You can order items in advance via UniKitOut. Use promo code NORTHUM10 for a 10% discount.

Alternatively, you can purchase beddings and towels from many shops in Newcastle City Centre. .

STAYING IN UNIVERSITY OWNED ACCOMMODATION? Visit the **accommodation FAQs** to find out what you will need to bring.

STAYING IN PRIVATE ACCOMMODATION?

Check with your landlord or provider first before packing any household items.



PLAN YOUR JOURNEY

Once you have secured your place on your course, obtained your visa and confirmed your accommodation, you should arrange your journey to Newcastle.

Air: If you can, you should buy a plane ticket to Newcastle International Airport. The airport is located 15 minutes taxi ride from <u>Newcastle City</u> <u>Campus</u>, or 35 minutes by Metro (underground train).

We also offer a Meet and Greet Airport Transfer Service for students arriving to study in January 2025. The service is available for flights arriving before 9pm (21:00) GMT and must be booked at least 7 days in advance. For further information and to book please visit <u>Meet and Greet</u>.

If you fly to an alternative airport, you will need to plan your onward journey to Newcastle via a domestic flight, <u>train</u> or <u>coach</u>. **Rail:** You can travel to the UK by train on the <u>Eurostar</u> from mainland Europe. Eurostar terminates in London so you will need to plan your onward journey to Newcastle by plane, train or coach.

Sea: There are several <u>ferry</u> <u>providers</u> offering sailings to the UK from mainland Europe. You will need to plan your onward journey from the port to Newcastle by plane, <u>train</u> or <u>coach</u>.

The nearest port to Newcastle is North Shields, a 20 minute taxi ride or 35 minute journey by **bus transfer**. Ferries arrive from Amsterdam daily.



BEFORE YOU ARRIVE



Most international students require a student visa to study in the UK. Determining if you need a visa is straightforward - just visit the <u>UK government's official website</u>.

Your visa will normally enable you to reside and study in the UK for the duration of your course.




MONEY AND FUNDING

Make sure your finances are in order and that you have sufficient funds to cover tuition fees and living expenses. The article <u>Managing your Money</u> in <u>Ask4Help Online</u> on your Student Portal has lots of information to help you.

Start arranging money transfers as early as possible, especially if your country imposes restrictions on the amount of money that can be transferred abroad.



We provide a variety of housing options for our students, all conveniently situated on or near the campus. University accommodation is highly sought after, so we encourage you to book early. detailed insights into your programme, fostering connections and enhancing your study skills for success.

For most programmes, attendance is compulsory for all academic related activity such as the University Welcome and Programme Welcome.

MY VISA IS DELAYED, WHAT IF I MISS WELCOME WEEK?

Please aim to arrive in Newcastle the week prior to Welcome Week so that you can get settled. However, we know due to visa processing times this is not always possible.

If you are not going to be able to arrive in time for Welcome Week, please contact us via the article Arriving on campus for Newcastle Campus students in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal and we can discuss your options with you.

Please note that you MUST enrol before your enrolment deadline date.

If you miss Freshers' Week you can still join any of the societies and events run by the Students' Union. Please visit **mynsu.co.uk** or go into the Union to ask how you can get involved.

WHEN YOU ARRIVE

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

As well as enrolling onto your programme, and paying your tuition fees, there are a number of practical tasks you will need to complete as soon as possible.

OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

You should consider opening a UK bank account when you arrive in the UK. This will make it easier for you to send and make payments. Please see the article **Opening** a UK bank account and requesting a bank letter in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal for further information. Most UK banks offer student bank accounts. It will be worth looking round for one which has the best rates on international transfers.

What documentation will you need to set up an account?

- Current passport
- Valid Visa (for those from outside the European Union)
- Home bank statement from the past three months
- Proof of address in the UK or abroad

ARRANGING YOUR COUNCIL TAX, TV LICENCE AND UTILITIES

Depending on your accommodation you may need to pay additional bills on top of your rent such as:

- Council Tax
- TV Licence
- Utilities such as water, electricity, gas and broadband
- Contents insurance

Check with your landlord as some bills may be included in the price of your rent. Please see the article **Getting started at Newcastle Campus** in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal for further information and guidance.

If you are staying in **University owned** accommodation (Claude Gibb, Glenamara House, Lovaine Hall, New Bridge Street, Trinity Square and Winn) your rent includes all of your utility bills, basic contents insurance and Wi-Fi.

Households where everyone is a full-time student don't have to pay Council Tax. If you do get a bill, you can apply for an exemption.

To count as a full-time student, your course must:

- Last at least 1 year
- Involve at least 21 hours study per week

APPLYING FOR NATIONAL INSURANCE (NI) NUMBER

A lot of students are interested in having a part-time job whilst at university and you'll be required to provide a National Insurance number (abbreviated as NI) to your employer. Please see the article Applying for a National Insurance number in Ask4Help Online in your Student Portal.

WHEN YOU ARRIVE

REGISTERING WITH A DOCTOR/GP

It is essential that you register with a local doctor's surgery, so that you can see a doctor - often called a "General Practitioner" or "GP" - when you need to. Please register as soon as possible, do not wait until you are unwell! SIM CARDS AND DUO

If you are joining from outside of the UK, you may need to obtain a UK SIM card for your mobile phone. SIM options include Contract or Pay as You Go.

Contracts: These are annual agreements tailored to your preferences, requiring a UK bank account for direct debit setup.

Pay As You Go: This option lets you purchase minutes and data as needed, offering greater flexibility to choose and change your plan.

DUO MULTI-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION SOFTWARE

GET THE SAFEZONE APP

SafeZone is a free app for Northumbria University students, which connects you directly to the University's security team when you need help at City or Coach Lane campuses, as well as at Bullocksteads sports ground.

TRANSPORT AND FINDING YOUR WAY AROUND

LOCAL TRAVEL

The preferred methods of public transport in Newcastle are bus and Metro. You can purchase a travel card for both through most travel operators to save money, especially if you are going to be making multiple journeys.

If you're paying for individual journeys by bus, the conductor must be paid in either cash or by card before you sit down. With <u>Metro</u>, you can buy a ticket from the station via the ticket machines.

Travelling on Stagecoach Buses? Buy a <u>**Uni Rider pass**</u> which can help you save money.

If you're using the Metro, you can get a **<u>student Pop Card</u>** which will give you discounts on travel.

You can also buy a <u>Network One ticket</u> <u>for Students and Young People</u>. This covers you on both the bus and metro.

Be sure to shop around to find out which travel pass is right for you.

NATIONAL TRAVEL

If you are in the UK for the first time, you'll probably want to visit a few different cities and sights while you're here.

Your two main options here are coach or train. Trains are often the quickest and most comfortable way to get around the UK. However, tickets should be booked as early as possible to save money – usually around three months in advance to get the best deals. You'll probably also want to invest in a 16-25 Railcard, which will save you a third on all rail fares!

TRAVELLING TO CAMPUS

Newcastle is a compact city with road and rail connections to towns and villages across the north east. Plan your journey to campus using the links below:

You can also **travel for free** on the Stagecoach number 1 bus between City and Coach Lane campuses using your Smartcard.

HELP AND SUPPORT

We hope that you have a smooth journey to the UK and you are happy in your new home. However, we understand that sometimes problems arise and you may need help. At Northumbria University, our frontline student support service, Ask4Help, is here to support you throughout your studies. Whether you need information, advice or guidance, Ask4Help connects you with expert support:

- <u>Mental Health and Wellbeing</u> specialist support to help manage stress, anxiety, and other mental health challenges.
- <u>Accessibility</u> ensuring students have equal access to educational opportunities by providing support for students with physical conditions, health conditions including mental health, specific learning differences such as dyslexia and ADHD and neurodiversity.
- Inclusion practical support for student carers, care leavers, estranged students and Sanctuary Scholars.
- <u>Finance</u> from scholarships and funding options to budgeting advice, we're here to help you navigate financial concerns.

- <u>Faith and Spiritual Care</u> support for students from all faiths and beliefs, offering spiritual care and community connections.
- <u>Welfare</u> to access information, advice and guidance around general welfare issues, including keeping safe at University.
- <u>International</u> specialist support for international students including visa and immigration advice.
- <u>Career and Employment Advice</u> the Graduate Futures team provide assistance with career planning, job searches, and employment skills to set students on the path to success.
- <u>Study Skills</u> resources and guidance to help you excel in your academic studies including referencing, time management and essay writing.

ACADEMIC LANGUAGE SKILLS (ALS)

The UK education system might differ from what you are used to, particularly in teaching methods and assessments. To help international students adapt, Northumbria University offers an Academic Language Skills (ALS) module.

GETTING SETTLED

WORKING IN THE UK

Working alongside your academic studies is a good opportunity to gain valuable work experience as well as earn some additional money.

Provided you have the correct visa, you will be allowed to work parttime while studying in the UK. You must check your visa conditions carefully and seek clarification if you are unsure. You can find out more and request support from an adviser through the article **Working on a Student visa** in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal.

PROVIDING CONFIRMATION OF YOUR RIGHT TO WORK.

Your employer may request that you provide a letter from the University to confirm that you are allowed to work alongside your studies. Please follow the instructions in the article **Working on a Student visa** in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal to generate a letter for your employer.

NATIONAL INSURANCE

You must have a National Insurance number if you want to work in the UK at any time during your studies.

If you have an eVisa, you might have a National Insurance number already. You can find it by logging into your <u>UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI)</u> account to view your eVisa.

If you do not have a National Insurance number, you must apply for one as soon as possible if you plan to work. Please follow the guidance in the article <u>Applying for</u> <u>a National Insurance number</u> in Ask4Help Online on your Student Portal.
