On 6 June 2023, Dr Fabio Tronchetti presented at 'Space Resources - Chances and Legal Challenges' event which was hosted by University of Vienna and NPOC Space Law Austria. The event focused on one discussion in particular, the Artemis Accords. On this panel Fabio spoke alongside experts from Japan, Luxembourg, Rwanda and Italy to provide perspectives on the Artemis Accords, their relationship to other international agreements, such as the moon agreement, and the views of developing countries.



# Professor Vanessa Bettinson discusses coercion, control and criminal responsibility

Professor Vanessa Bettinson has collaborated with **Professors** Vanessa Munro and Mandy Burton on a coercive control project that explores the concept of coercive control amongst criminal justice professionals in England, Wales and Scotland. The article 'Coercion, and Criminal Responsibility: Exploring Professional Responses to Offending and Suicidality in the Context of Domestically Abusive Relationships' is the first to explore criminal justice professionals thinking about coercive control present in criminal justice, not as an offence, but as a reason for offenders' criminality where they are in domestically abusive relationships, or are the victim of coercive control and have committed suicide as a consequence of it.

#### Al in sentencing and management of offenders

In 2023, Northumbria University's Centre for Evidence and Criminal Justice Studies, alongside the Alan Turing Institute, hosted a seminar 'The use of Al in sentencing and the management of offenders' at the Turing Institute's London headquarters within the British Library. The seminar, organised by Dr Elizabeth Tiarks from Northumbria Law School and presented by Dr Marion Oswald, explored the current and proposed future uses of Al in sentencing and more broadly the management of offenders.

### Dr Helen Rutherford sheds light on 19th century Newcastle

In July 2023, Dr Rutherford attended the inaugural 'Legal Records Jamboree', at The National Archive supported by The Journal of Legal History and British Online Archives. Helen discussed a coroner notebook from an inquest dating back to 1857, which shed light on coroners' practise in Northumberland during the 19th century. Helen's research was also recently featured in Newcastle's 'The Journal' over a two-page spread. Helen's research has spanned five years and has shed light on life in Newcastle during the 19th century.




#### Re-imagining step-down in children's residential care

Professors Nicola Wake and Ray Arthur, co-organised with collaborators at Leeds Beckett University and Bournemouth University and supported by David Gibson, an in-person interactive knowledge exchange event designed to stimulate discussion around re-imagining secure residential care for children. The workshop identified factors for further research linked to developing step-down provision from residential care and assessing risks associated with child criminal exploitation. The work supports a broader programme by the team on re-imagining secure residential care for some of the most vulnerable children in society.



### Law School staff present at 'Legal Histories, Local Histories' Conference

Northumbria Law School staff Neil Harrison, Dr Helen Rutherford and Jacqueline Smart presented at the international 'Legal Histories, Local Histories' conference in November 2023. The team represented the North East at the event which brought international researchers into conversation with each other and explored the benefits of their different approaches and perspectives.
