


WHAT DOES A QUANTITY SURVEYOR DO?



How long does it take to become a chartered quantity surveyor?

postgraduate qualification

months of on-the-job training as a graduate trainee quantity surveyor. After this, you can sit your Assessment of Professional Competence

This would take approximately **five** and a half years, but would include the APC qualification as

part of your training. You would gain chartered status upon successful completion. *Dependant upon employer and demands of projects. At high demand and peak times, you may be expected to work longer hours but this is often balanced out by employers allowing staff to take time

(APC) to become a fully chartered QS.
