## RECLAMA (Harnessing Afro-Ecuadorian Women's Heritage) Follow-up work

We're excited that the RECLAMA team have secured a **British Academy Maximising Impact grant** for follow-up work: "**RECLAMA: Visibilising Afro-Ecuadorian Women's Heritage for Anti-racist and Sustainable Development**". This project will engage with policy makers, school children, and wider audiences on a range of activities to promote positive representations of Afro-Ecuadorian women and girls and increase their involvement in the public sphere, based on the work undertaken by the team since 2019. Activities will run between March 2023 – February 2024 and will include a webinar, as well as exhibitions and activities in Cali, Colombia and London, UK. # RYVU celebrates International Volunteer Day and joins the North East Festival of Languages

The **RYVU (Refugee Youth Volunteering Uganda)** project celebrated International Volunteer Day 2022 by launching a collection of policy briefings and interactive games which were also part of the 2023 "Express Yourself: North East Festival of Languages".



The policy briefings highlight the central findings of RYVU's research, and provide proposals for improving refugees' livelihoods through volunteering, and enhancing the impacts of volunteering on refugee skills and employability. The three interactive games are creative tools designed to encourage constructive discussions and raise awareness of the issues outlined by RYVU's findings. ## Reports on Blended Volunteering collaborative research published

Working in collaboration with VSO, CGD staff published the outcomes of their research into the concept and practices of blended volunteering. This collaborative research explored how different types of volunteering come together, how different combinations of volunteers may work in different sorts of ways, and what kinds of impacts and outputs this produces, and for whom. In order to understand the roles and potential of blended volunteering for VSO's programming and beyond, three case study countries were selected: Tanzania; Uganda; and Nepal. ## Interdisciplinary Research Themes (IDRT) Conference

Northumbria University organised its first Interdisciplinary Research Themes (IDRTs) Conference in January 2023. The IDRTs are communities of practice bringing together expertise from across the University, to address pressing regional, societal and global challenges. There are currently seven IDRTs within Northumbria University, including Global Development Futures (GDF). Members of the Global Development Centre took part in running two sessions at the IDRT Conference, which led to a wide range of interesting interdisciplinary conversations and new connections.
