RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS





Voluntary Labour, Climate Adaptation & Disasters (VOCAD) exhibition

Researchers from CGD and Jadavpur University, Kolkata recently shared their research on the role of voluntary work in meeting the challenges of climate change through a photography exhibition and the launch of a bilingual photobook at the Deputy High Commission in Kolkata. Hosted by the Deputy High Commissioner, Dr Andrew Fleming, the event attracted diverse civil society organisations and other stakeholders, and shared images and narratives of volunteering captured by members of communities in the Indian Sundarbans.

The research has been conducted as part of Living Deltas, a transdisciplinary research hub funded by the UK Government's Research and Innovation Fund and Global Challenges Research Fund.

The led Matt Baillie Smith from research team, by Northumbria University and Banerjee from Jadavpur Sumana used participatory approaches, including photography and diary University, writing, to prioritise the voices and experiences of community members in the Sundarbans. This provides unique and important insights into the ways those community members think about and participate in voluntary work. The exhibition and book call for recognition of the importance of voluntary work by marginalised communities in meeting the challenges of the climate crisis. They also aim to prompt change through the creation of more inclusive and fair approaches to volunteer mobilisation. Find out more about the VOCAD research initiative here.

Sustainable Wildlife Management in Zambia

Francis Masse has been involved in a research project funded by the EU-UNFAO CIFOR-ICRAF <u>Sustainable Wildlife Management Programme</u> in Zambia to support the development of wildlife and livestock based economies in community conservancies. This has included:

- the completion of research and a report and policy brief to stakeholders on the Structure and Evolution of the Legal Wild Meat Value Chain in Zambia.

- ongoing research on participatory mapping and ranking of zoonotic and animal disease risks in Mize Community Conservancy in support of land-use management plans.

In March 2024 we enjoyed a fantastic presentation from CGD researcher **Katherine Arrell** on Participatory Mapping of Mobility: Understanding Dynamic Exposure to Cascading Mountain Hazards in Rural Nepal.
