

INSTRUMENT OF GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTHUMBRIA AT NEWCASTLE

The Instrument and the accompanying Articles of Government are the legal documents which determine the status of the University, and which define the basis for its operation. Details of how their provisions are to be implemented are set out in the Governance Regulations, Staff Governor Appointment Regulations and Election Regulations – Staff Governor Nominated by Academic Board. The Instrument and the accompanying Articles of Government were approved by the University's Board of Governors on 30 June 2025 and came into effect on 1 August 2025.

Cross-references beginning AG are to the Articles of Government, cross-references beginning GR are to the Governance Regulations, cross-references beginning AR are to the Staff Governor Appointment Regulations and cross-references beginning AB are to the Election Regulations – Staff Governor Nominated by Academic Board.

4	MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS		
4.1	The Board of Governors shall consist of: 4.1.1 the Vice-Chancellor and Chief Executive in accordance with 5.1.4 below; 4.1.2 up to thirteen Independent Members; 4.1.3 up to three Co-opted Members, and 4.1.4 the Internal Members as follows: a. two students nominated by the Students' Union b. one member of academic staff nominated by the Academic Board in accordance with the Election Regulations – Staff Governor Nominated by	AB5 ff

5	TENURE OF OFFICE OF MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS		
5.1	The Board of Governors shall determine the periods of office of the Independent Members, the Co-opted Members and the Internal Members, provided that such terms do not exceed those prescribed or endorsed by the Regulator. Such members shall hold and vacate office in accordance with the terms of their appointment as follows:		
	5.1.1 Independent Members shall serve a maximum of three times three-year terms of office.	GR2.5

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8	MEMBERS ALLOWANCES, BENEFITS AND REMUNERATION

8.2	The University may, and may only, confer benefits on members of the Board of Governors if the benefit has been authorised by the Board of Governors in accordance with the Governance Regulations, which must comply with the Charity Commission's guidelines. In this paragraph, "benefit" includes: (a) buying any goods or services from the University; (b) selling goods, services or any interest in land to the University; (c) being employed by, or receiving any remuneration from the University; (d) receiving any other financial benefit from the University.	
9	SEAL	
9.1	The application of the seal of the University shall be authenticated by the signatures of any two members of the Board of Governors, at least one of whom must be an Independent Member, on appropriate legal advice or on the advice of the Secretary. A register of sealings shall be maintained by the University and execution under the seal should be reported to the next meeting of the Finance and Resources Committee.	
9.2	The Secretary shall ensure that the University Seal is held under secure arrangements.	
10	AMENDMENTS TO THE INSTRUMENT OF GOVERNMENT	
10.1	The University may vary, replace or revoke this Instrument of Government in accordance with the requirements set out in the Articles of Government, provided that such changes would not result in the University ceasing to be a charity.	
11	DATE OF INSTRUMENT	
11.1	This Instrument is dated 1 August 2025 and shall come into operation immediately.	
11.2	The Instrument shall routinely be reviewed every three years, with the next reviewed version coming into operation on 1 August 2028 and on every third anniversary thereafter. Amendments to the Instrument will also be made if required by changes in internal arrangements or external requirements, and will be submitted to Nominations Committee for endorsement and Board of Governors for approval.
